




USDA-NRCS Chief Lohr's Priorities

- 1. Implement and deliver the 2018 Farm Bill to our nation's farmers, ranchers, and private foresters.
- 2. Streamline our processes and program delivery to best serv our customers.
- 3. Better understand customer needs and improve overall customer service.
- 4. Soil Health and working with our customers in helping keep our soils intact, productive and healthy for generations to come





Improved Processes

- Conservation Assessment Ranking Tool (CART)
- Conservation Desktop
- Simplifying the application process for producers
- States can Develop Screening Tool for CSP to align with EQIP
- Removing Burdensome Documentation Requirements for Control of Land
- Expand eligible producer to include operators, owners, and other tenants as shown in FSA farm records






Conservation Assessment Ranking Tool (CART)

- Program-neutral, centralized application evaluation tool
- 1 ranking tool for all programs
- Modernize and streamline conservation planning & program delivery
- Reduce workload on field staff
- Improves customer experience





Environmental Quality Incentives Program - EQIP





Changes to EQIP

- Adds resource concerns
- Raises cap for organic producers
- New enrollment option to address resource concerns
- Advance payments for historically underserved producers
- Contracts with entities like Irrigation Districts and Canal Companies





Conservation Stewardship Program - CSP





Changes to CSP

Increases payment rates for certain activities

Authorizes contract extensions

Provides specific support for organic

Includes special grassland conservation initiative





Top Ten look at the CSP interim final rule and policy manual update

- 1. Expands who may be an eligible participant to include the operator, owner, or other tenant as identified in FSA records, which eliminates the need for operator of record waivers.
- 2. Removes the need for producers to request in writing an exemption for the farmstead.
- 3. Removes the protocol to request new enhancements from policy. There will still be a process, just not defined in policy. This will allow NRCS to more easily refine and improve the process over time without having to update policy.
- 4. Removes required NRCS payment deadlines in December and March which reduces States having to submit waivers.
- Removes the requirement to implement an enhancement by the third year of the contract. This allows more flexibility for our customers and reduces the number of waivers.
- 6. Removes the annual payment limitation which will eliminate the need for APL waivers when payments are delayed.
- 7. Expands the higher contract limit to include all business type 2 and 3 participants and not just those with an EIN.
- 8. Removes the CSP preapproval letter, simplifies the CSP pre-obligation checklist and incorporates the CSP-GCI pre-obligation checklist into policy. Incorporates an EQIP pre-obligation checklist and significantly streamlines the checklist to only include critical items of risk that are not automated.
- Removes the need for a State bulletin for duplicative payments; however, States
 must still identify conservation activities that may be duplicative with other
 programs.
- 10. Removes the requirement for the annual 10% contract reviews.

In summary, NRCS has streamlined CSP by basing contracts on funds instead of acres, bringing it in line with EQIP. Additionally, NRCS is aligning CSP with EQIP through common applications, contracting operations, conservation planning, conservation practices and related administrative procedures.

Authorizes RCPP contracts


Expands flexibility for funding

Agricultural Conservation Easement Program - ACEP





Changes to ACEP

- Assistance for 'Buy-Protect-Sell' transactions
- New requirements for highly erodible land
- Increases flexibility for partners
- Adds water quality as resource concern
- Expands wetland eligibility






Crop Insurance & Cover Crops

- Interagency workgroup between NRCS, FSA and RMA with input from growers
- Developed consistent cover crop policy across 3 agencies
- NRCS Cover Crop Termination Guidelines
- Insurance options through RMA Good Farming Practice determinations
- Provides additional level of comfort for producers using cover crops

Watershed and Flood Prevention Operations

Overview

- Public Law 83-566, Public Law 78-534
- NRCS cooperates with local Sponsors
- Sponsors carry out, operate, and maintain projects
- NRCS provides technical, financial, and credit assistance
- Authorized Project Purposes include:
 - Erosion and sediment control
 - Watershed protection
 - Flood prevention
 - Water quality Improvements
 - Rural, municipal and industrial water supply
 - Water management
 - Fish and wildlife habitat enhancement
 - Hydropower sources

Statistics

- Over 2,000 watershed projects
- Over 11,840 watershed dams
- \$2.2 billion in average annual benefits nationwide

Watershed and Flood Prevention Operations

Eligibility

- Public Sponsorship
- Watershed Projects up to 250,000 acres
- Max total capacity of 25,000 acre-feet
- 20% of benefits must be agriculture related
- Authorized NRCS watershed plan EA/EIS
- Congressional approval for federal funding over \$25 million for construction
